Private Music Lessons: Violin, Viola, Cello

Grades: 3-12

Course Goals: Private lessons allow students to receive one on one instruction for either beginning or continuing study. An emphasis on technique and music literacy through the study of music repertoire and technical studies will be the focus. Students who wish to someday join the middle or high school orchestra and cannot fit beginning orchestra into their schedules can use these private lessons as an opportunity to become eligible for these ensembles in future school years.

Private Voice Lessons

Grades: 7-12 (first Semester)
Tuition: \$25/30 minute lesson

In voice lessons, students will get to explore their voices through learning new pieces of music in various genres. Students will work individually with their instructor to create personal goals for their vocal journey and then work towards those goals in every lesson. Students will learn about vocal technique and health, how to read music, ear training, and how to sing expressively. Homework will be practice time at home and research of their pieces. At the end of the semester, students will get to perform in a voice recital for their parents and peers.

The Vocal Performance Studio Class is included with registered Journey student's voice lessons and is no extra fee. Students will work up a couple of pieces throughout the semester in their private lessons and then perform them in class. During class, students will receive constructional feedback from their instructor and, if they so wish, from their colleagues. Through this, students will grow in confidence in their performance abilities, and learn how to give and receive constructive feedback with encouragement and positivity; all while being in a comfortable space. They will also learn more about vocal technique by observing their colleagues, performing their pieces, and thinking critically about how to become the best performer they can be!

PreK/Kindergarteners will learn through a variety of lessons and activities based around children's rich literature. With these books we will have a chance to expand and explore social studies, language, art, applied math and even science. We will learn together through a variety of activities that will be developmentally age appropriate to your child. There will be a chance to further explore these activities with suggested books and activities to do with your child at home if you desire. Children will be exposed to a friendly classroom environment and expected to work respectively and cooperatively with teachers, assistants, and peers learning/strengthening basic classroom manners. During the school year, we will also have a chance to explore our outside environment. Suggested and appropriate seasonal attire is required on all days unless severe weather is present.

This class will be all about fun and developing a love and curiosity for science, the world around us, and the God that made it all! It doesn't matter if your child learns best through visual, auditory, kinesthetic, or reading and writing-there will be something for everyone in this course! The principles for this "Investigate and Explore" adventure will be to expose students to a diversity of topics and vocabulary, without information overkill. Students will be exposed to American Sign Language (ASL) through ASL vocabulary of the week that relates to topics covered throughout the course. This year's topics will include things like space, botany, outdoor education, and animals. No text necessary and no outside class work required. For families who are interested in outside class work, review questions/answers and activity/experiment ideas will be emailed weekly for you to complete at home as you wish. (2-year rotation course)

Exploring Creation with Zoology 3: Land Animals of the Sixth Day

This year's topic for Grade 3/4 is Land Animals! It is going to be a fun class that I think your children will love! It doesn't matter if your child learns best through visual, auditory, kinesthetic, or reading and writing-there will be something for everyone in this course! Students will be exposed to American Sign Language (ASL) through ASL vocabulary of the week that relates to topics covered throughout the course too! We will cover three main groups of animals-wild animals, livestock, and creeping creatures. Land Animals gives us the perfect opportunity to begin to develop a love for exploring our environment. We will use Apologia's Exploring Creation series, which is a favorite science curriculum used by many homeschooling families. It is built on a solid creationist foundation, always directs our attention to the amazing character of our Creator God, and incorporates a Charlotte Mason approach using the tools of narration and notebooking. Class will be fast paced with a wide variety of activities including lots of exciting labs and experiments, Bible Knowledge, art, and life skills. Students will be asked to read certain portions of the text at home during the week and optional homework will be assigned. Homework will not be required but strongly encouraged as it will help reinforce understanding of topics covered in class. No previous exposure to any Apologia's text is necessary.

The study of History and Geography through a biblical lens help to lay a solid foundation of knowledge that is extremely useful to orient us throughout our lives. During the middle school years, students are ready to engage in their learning at a new level, so it is a good time to solidify key events, people and dates on a timeline that can provide a solid framework for future reference and study of history, while also giving them new insights into events they may already have learned about at the elementary stage. In this class, students will also be asked to discuss and report on what they are learning, so it gives them practice in shaping and expressing their own views along with practicing public speaking skills in a setting of peers. Our studies will take us back over the last 800 plus years of European history, including kingdoms, cultures and events involving Africa and Asia as well. To aid us in this study, we will also review basic world geography, focusing on the Eastern Hemisphere, which will reinforce what students have learned in their elementary years. To this end, we will revisit the major countries and important cities of Europe, Africa, Asia and the Pacific Rim, and the major geographic features that shape these areas.

The homework for this class will include weekly reading assignments, short answer responses to discussion questions, geography exercises and maps; all of which will require about 30-45 minutes, 3-4 days a week. There will be occasional short quizzes in class on the reading assignments and a take at home test after each Unit. As part of our studies, we will

read 1-2 middle school level books that are about a specific person or time period. The students will also be asked to share several short reports in class over the course of the school year (including a poster and/or a PowerPoint).

In French 2, students will reinforce and build upon fundamental French skills learned in French 1.
